How is everyone enjoying their summer so far? We have been blessed with some cooler weather so far, but I do not doubt it will be heating up across the desert, soon.

We are anxiously awaiting the completion of the docks in the marina. They are coming along and are a nice facelift for our marina.

Last month, I reported that we have teamed up with Lahontan Water Board to perform a series of Harmful Algae Bloom (HAB) samplings to ensure we stay on top of any possible toxic algae blooms in the lake. Lahontan reached out to us and asked if we would be willing to perform the samplings and they would add us as

a test site. We gladly obliged, as it is beneficial for us to do these samplings throughout the summer months.

There are a couple of factors that make us susceptible to experience a toxic algae bloom. One being the water that we receive from the fish hatchery. While the water that comes from our wells is fresh water, the water that flows in from the fish hatchery is full of nutrients, due to the fish that are raised at the hatchery. This nutrient rich water mixed with the high temperatures is what can cause the toxic algae to bloom and thrive.

Our Lake Committee has been working diligently with Lahontan Water Board to have some parameters put on the fish hatchery to limit the amount of nutrients that can be present in the water that is released.

In addition to us performing routine water sampling and monitoring we have installed many systems over the years to enhance and maintain the quality of our lake. We have the floating islands, UV filters and aeration systems. I will be spending time touching on each of these over the next couple of months to give the community some insight to our

lake.

We have been doing our best to continue with the lake clean up weekly. If you notice any areas with excessive trash or debris, it is always helpful to let us know. Give the office a call or send an email to maintenance@svla.com.

Lightning Storm Safety Information



Now that the late summer and fall season is upon us, lightning storms are becoming increasingly common and it is important to be aware of possible dangers. Lightning can reach temperatures in excess of 50,000 degrees Fahrenheit, which is **HOTTER THAN THE SURFACE OF THE SUN!!** On average, there are 25 million lightning strikes per year. The best way to protect yourself and your loved ones is to be aware of how to recognize and avoid lightning strikes.

The first thing you could do to avoid being struck by lightning is to recognize the signs of an incoming lightning storm. Look for dark grey clouds moving towards your location, flashes of light, and listen for the sounds of thunder. You could also refer to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration by visiting <http://>

www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov/safety.shtml for more information on lightning strikes and storms in your area.

During a lightning storm one of the **WORST** places to be is in or around water. So please remember that the lifeguards at the beach area will take every precaution to keep the residents safe. This may include evacuating the water using one long and loud whistle blast, or even evacuating the entire beach. Public safety officers will take all precautions leading



up to sounding our lake siren. In the event of a lightning storm, public safety officers will sound off one very loud wailing alarm which means everyone must stop all boating operations and immediately exit the water. Once the storm has passed, the lake siren will proceed to sound off a constant steady alarm which means it

is now safe to resume all activities on the lake.

Remember, “When the thunder roars, stay indoors!” However, being indoors does not completely protect you. If lightning strikes the roof of the building you are currently seeking shelter in, there is still a possibility of electrocution that may result in minor to severe burns. Lightning can travel through the plumbing of your home and injure you, or your loved ones. So please remember it is not safe to shower during a se-

vere lightning storm. Even if you take the proper precautions, there is still the slight chance that you can be caught outdoors in a severe lightning storm. If this happens remember these following safety tips. Stay away from tall stand-alone objects like street lights, trees, or other poles. Stay low to the ground and off any objects like playground equipment, ladders, and lifeguard towers. Finally, stay in a fetal position in the middle of an open area, away from tall objects, crouching on two feet rather than laying down or sitting down.

How to Survive a Lightning Strike

Crouch down low like a baseball catcher. Get as low as you can. The nearer you are to the ground, the less likely you are to be struck by lightning. But never lie down!

If your hair begins to stand on end or your skin starts to tingle, a lightning strike is imminent. Immediately get into the crouching position. Lightning may strike without this warning, however.

Place hands over ears to minimize hearing loss from the loud clap of thunder that will boom very close to you.

Don't touch any possible conductors.

The only thing touching the ground should be the balls of your feet. Lightning can hit the ground first, and then enter your body. The more you minimize your contact with the ground, the less chance of electricity entering your body.

Touch the heels of your feet together. If electricity from a ground strike enters through your feet, this increases the chances of the electricity going in one foot and out the other, rather than into the rest of your body.

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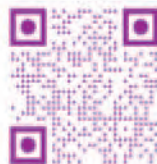
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CODE ENFORCEMENT

With Summer coming to a close soon and the kids going back to school, but the change of the season doesn't stop our annual inspections. So, you may see our officers' taking pictures of your house but don't be too worried as we will be taking pictures of every home even the ones that don't have violations. Our team has noticed some common occurrences and a couple of things you can do to prevent them happening.

Weeds/Yellowing grass

The high temperatures in the desert can play havoc to even the nicest lawns. Now that watering restrictions have been removed don't forget to water your lawn more frequently with these higher temperatures. This will also help any weeds grow so when you are coming home allocate a little time to pull any weeds budding up before they become large and harder to remove.

Parking Violations

When you're parking your cars or if you are having guests over

make sure that the vehicles are parked on the driveway and not on the rocks or landscaping. Also, all vehicles parked on your property seen from the street need to be moved every 72 hours. IF you have a car you are storing, we recommend you leave it in your garage to avoid this issue.

Above Ground Pools

With the high heat many residents have been looking to get above ground pools. If you are planning on getting one keep in mind that only kiddie pools that hold less than 15 gallons are the only approved above ground pools.

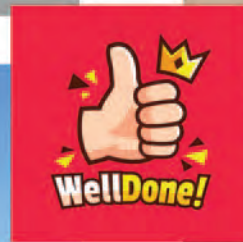

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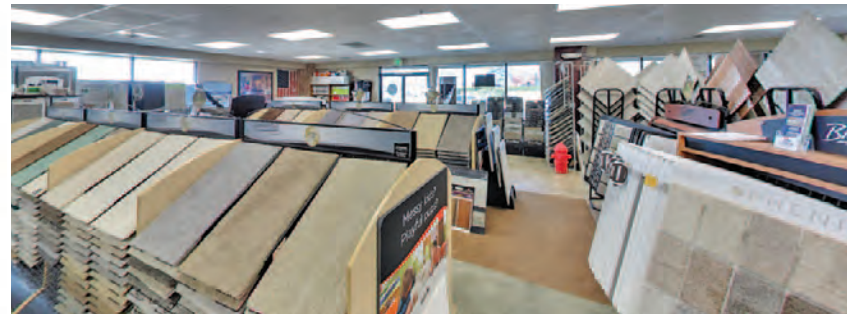

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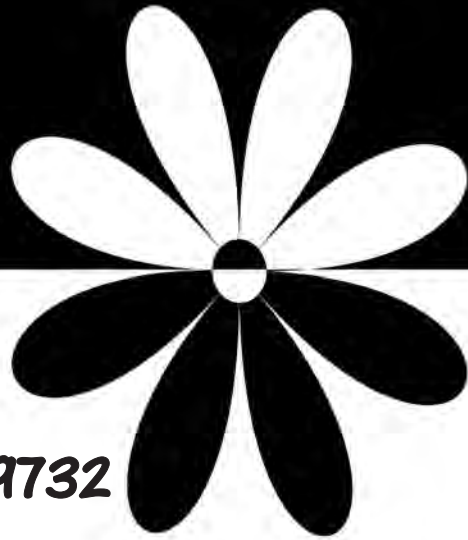
